Why a Summer Session?

Vertus's innovative year-round model allows students more than 125% of the learning time available in a traditional school each year. Our students need this gift of additional time to help ensure that they pass all 5 required Regents exams and graduate on time, fully prepared for both college and careers.

Toward this end, we have pledged to help our students achieve at least 1 1/2 years of academic growth every school year. Our summer session is crucial to helping students attain this goal.

Physical Education Credit

This summer, Vertus students will spend two hours a day at Total Sports Experience earning 0.5
Physical Education credit, which will put them on track to earn the required 2 PE credits by graduation. Our summer PE program will be supervised by a certified teacher and will include a variety of indoor and outdoor sports and conditioning activities. We are excited to be able to provide this high level of physical activity!

Summer Uniform: Black Vertus Polo, Khaki Shorts, and Sneakers

Polo shirts may be ordered at Vertus between May 11 and May 19. Sneakers must be clean and in good condition. Students may wear their own plain khaki shorts (no designs). See below for examples of acceptable shorts.













Summer Job Opportunities

At Vertus, we anticipate creating 12 part-time positions assembling 3D-printed prosthetic hands in collaboration with RIT's e-NABLE project. Details on how to apply will be shared with our students.

Special Academic Projects

Vertus is partnering with SUNY Brockport's Department of Education and Human Development to offer a five-week summer course taught by Brockport graduate students who are completing their adolescent summer literacy internship. This is a wonderful opportunity for our young men to receive one-on-one literacy tutoring with highly skilled instructors-in-training! English instructor José Barocio will also be teaching an intensive Regents writing preparatory workshop to help many of our students prepare for the upcoming exams.

Music Enrichment Class Travels to Buffalo to See The Phantom of the Opera

Andrew Lloyd Webber's The Phantom of the Opera is arguably the most popular stage production in world history. Having been seen by over 140 million people in 30 countries and translated into 13 languages, it is truly a cultural phenomenon. It is also a powerful, funny, dramatic, scary, and poignant show with great music, a captivating story, and occasional onstage explosions.

Vertus teacher Naomi Geier, who leads the Music enrichment class, had already seen Phantom four times when she saw a poster for the touring production while on a trip to Buffalo. She realized that her Music students would love the show and submitted a field trip request to Dr. Mac, who graciously agreed that Vertus would pay for tickets, transportation costs, and dinner.

This left Ms. Geier with three weeks to prepare her students for the trip. She began by teaching them about the Paris Opera House, the setting of the musical, which they were able to explore digitally via Google Culture. The students also listened to songs from the show, responded to stories from the plot, created a character map, and began to form their

STUDENT INTERVIEW: Preceptor Cory Johnson

What were your educational experiences growing up? Well, I'm born and raised in Rochester. For high school, I went to East High School; I went to a couple of different schools-I was at Franklin. I wasn't the greatest student, but I tried hard. After high school, I went to MCC and then I went to Empire College, and then Brockport.

What is it about Vertus that made you want to work here?

I've always worked with young men in the community. I actually worked for RCSD, where I ran a school, New Beginnings, and I've just always had a passion for working with young men and helping them excel, grow, and really find out who they are, and helping them develop their own character.

What are some of the struggles and successes you have seen this year?

I've seen the struggle of putting together a school. I've seen the struggles of some of the stuff that goes on in the city of Rochester and the community-our young men killing each other, our young men being arrested, even some of our young women-so I've seen a lot of those struggles. As far as successes, we see successes in this building every day. I see young men who only showed up to school maybe two, three times last year, showing up to school just about every day. I see young men who got straight Fs on report cards becoming A and B students. I look at a young man like you doing this interview right now-have you ever done anything like this before?

No.


That's a success. Coming out of your own comfort zone. So for me, the successes I see, especially in this building, are the young men who come out of their comfort zone to do better and to try different things.

Are you living your childhood or teenage dreams?

No, because growing up in the way I grew up, and with all the challenges that I faced in my own household, this was probably the last thing I ever wanted to do. But then when I got older and started working in the community, doing this, this is the passion that I found.

What specific actions have led you down the road to success and what do you think have been the secrets to your success?

Here, I'll tell you this - and I've never told anybody this; I'll share this secret with you. The secret to success is: there is no secret. There is no secret whatsoever to success. The secret is, I work hard every day. I work hard on every level. I work hard on rebuilding myself, every day, to become a better person. Whatever I do, I'm committed to it and I push myself. I'm obsessed with getting knowledge. I'm obsessed with seeing young men do better, which means I have to push myself to make sure I'm leading them in the right direction. So that's my secret: that there is no secret. You work hard. You work hard for any and everything that you want. And you don't accept "no." I've never accepted "no." I push myself. I don't stop. I don't stop.

But when they get in here, they're looking at things they normally wouldn't look at and getting ideas, they're able to pull things from different sources and come up with their own ideas—they realize they are creative.

I have some guys who are very experienced artists; I have some guys who'd never picked up a paintbrush before. So just the fact that they're embracing the difficulty of painting, that they're having enough courage to sit down and try it, is huge.

And they don't ridicule each other.

You have one student helping another student to draw a surfboard or, you know, "Your eye doesn't look right, so let me help

"Your eye doesn't look right, so let me help you fix that." It's just good to see them working together. A couple days ago, one guy was trying to draw a surfboard and he couldn't get it together and he called another student, who just came right over: "This is how you do it; this is what's wrong."

I have guys who are natural artists, but they don't have mentors and they don't know anyone else who draws or who paints, so they're trying to figure all this stuff out on their own. And I've learned a lot of stuff over the years, so if I can teach them how to properly put a head on a neck, or the proportions of a human bodyanything that would help them become better artists—that makes me feel good, because I didn't have anybody teaching me. I just learned by trial and error and messed up a whole lot of stuff for a long time. So when I went to art school, it really opened my eyes because it was, "OK, this is what it's supposed to look like, this is how it's supposed to work." If I'd had that a lot earlier. I would be a much better artist now.
