
PHOTOGRAPHERS TO WATCH...

Vertus offers enrichment courses that are hands-on, creative and collaborative ways for students to explore talents and interests. The Photography Enrichment Program, taught by visual artist, Charmaine Bynoe, and Vertus' own, Anna Mack, is designed to introduce students to the fundamentals of digital photography. Students learn to shoot and edit images, while learning and discussing the history of photography and the basics of composition, lighting, focus and framing. By the end of the course, students gain an understanding of the formal qualities and tools needed to create a successful photograph.

REPRESENTING IN ALBANY










REACHING OUR FUNDRAISING GOALS

Vertus at MCC Continued

To participate in college-level coursework, students at Vertus must have passed the Algebra I Regents Exam. They must also have a satisfactory behavior record. Two kinds of classes are offered for MCC credit—classes held at Vertus by an MCC-certified teacher, and classes that students take on the MCC campus with college students. In addition to earning credits that work toward a Students enrolled in the on-campus program are driven by bus to the MCC campus and then back to Vertus before going home.

Currently, students pursue courses in an Advanced Manufacturing track (for example, Precision Tooling) or an Information Technology track (for example, Introduction to Networking).

Our most advanced students can earn up to 32 transferable credits and a professional certificate by the time they graduate from high school.

"Our students are pioneers—showing what's possible for students from Rochester. Our students are proving that they can succeed in college level coursework while in high school", says Leigh McGuigan, co-founder of Vertus.

SUMMER SESSION

Vertus is a year round school with an extended school day during the regular academic year and a shorter day during the summer session. Throughout the entire year, Fridays at Vertus are half days, allowing students to pursue work opportunities or other interests.

During the summer session, students who do not need academic intervention may take Fridays off or work on Edgenuity during "open labs" on Friday mornings. A letter will be sent home notifying students if they need academic intervention.

Students also have the opportunity to apply for parttime summer jobs at Vertus, including the e-NABLE program using 3D printers.

All Vertus students are encouraged to work outside school hours throughout the school year. Vertus students complete most coursework in the classroom and rarely have homework, making it possible for them to work and also succeed in school. Information about work permits is available in the school office.

Getting a taste of college is an important part of the Vertus High School experience. This fall and spring, upper level students were welcomed by SUNY Fredonia, the University of Buffalo, St. John Fisher College, and SUNY Brockport for campus visits. Vertus students toured the campus academic buildings and dorms, ate college food and learned about college life.



VERTUS STUDENTS EMPLOYED BY DREAM BIKES

Vertus students are gaining hands-on mechanical and customer service experience as part of Dream Bikes Rochester; a local chapter of a national non-profit, with the goal of offering paid work experience to urban teens.

Dream Bikes opened in Rochester in February 2017, and offers refurbished bicycles and lightly used cycling equipment to the community at very reasonable prices. They have hired three Vertus students to help repair bikes to get them ready to sell, and perform maintenance on bicycles that customers drop-off for service. The students also help on the retail end of the store, assisting customers in the buying process—valuable skills that will help prepare them for college and entering the job market. "I am learning skills that I can use for things other than just fixing bikes," noted Dream Bikes employee and Vertus student Justin McGill.

Along with the three paid employees from Vertus, Dream Bikes has also been working in conjunction with Vertus Technical Performance System class, offering new mechanical insights and education about the science and engineering that goes into bicycle design. As spring and summer arrive in Rochester, Dream Bikes will be looking to expand their program and employ additional students that show an interest in mechanics and customer service.

Dream Bikes' Rochester location is one of six stores nationwide that are working to provide paid, hands-on job experience to teens, give access to quality bicycles to those in need, and keep bicycles and cycling equipment out of our landfills. Since 2008, Dream Bikes has refurbished and returned more than 15,000 bikes to the public, provided paid work experience to over 190 teens nationwide, and awarded more than 20 educational and mechanical scholarships to Dream Bikes employees. With support from our students and the public, Dream Bikes hopes to continue offering and even expand their program to help our communities thrive, and give more people the opportunity to see the world from the seat of a bicycle.

ROCHESTER E-NABLE MAKES VERTUS HOME

The Rochester e-NABLE Program has made Vertus High School its new home, after formerly being housed at the Rochester Institute of Technology. Students will be able to find them in the Maker Space. e-NABLE is a community of volunteers from all over the world who use 3D printers to create 3D printed hands and arms for those in need. Jon Schull, founder of the global e-NABLE movement says, "When I retired from RIT, I jumped at the chance of working at Vertus, with whom we had previously conducted two pioneering summer programs."

Thirty-six Vertus students have gained 3D printing experience through the e-NABLE program for the past two summers. They've printed dozens of prosthetics to be given away at no cost. e-NABLE senior designer, Skip Meetze noted that "going forward, we expect to expand the scope of our work beyond hands and arms, and work with Vertus students on design, testing, problem-solving, and social entrepreneurship, as well as 3D-printing.

Having e-NABLE on the Vertus campus gives students inspirational STEM education programming opportunities and advanced work in the Maker Space, while demonstrating how technology can be used to create life-changing solutions for those who live with disabilities.

Some students will be employed by e-NABLE, as lab technicians after school and in our summer e-NABLE program.
