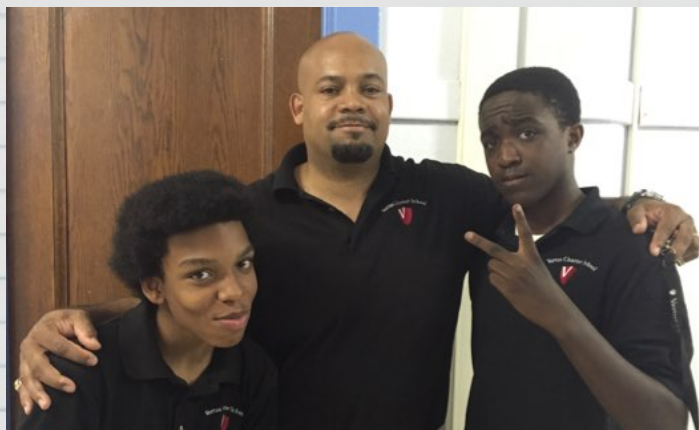

Vertus Students Join Local FIRST Robotics Competition Team

Robotics has been one of Vertus' hands-on learning activities since the school opened, but this year, a group of committed Robotics students is taking their experience to the next level. Five Vertus students will compete in FIRST Robotics' annual competition, which draws thousands of high school students from all over the world.

As FIRST Robotics explains the competition on its website, "Under strict rules, limited resources, and an intense six-week time limit, teams of 20 or more students are challenged to raise funds, design a team 'brand,' hone teamwork skills, and build and program industrial-size robots to play a difficult field game against like-minded competitors. It's as close to real-world engineering as a student can get."

Vertus is participating in FIRST Robotics through Team 3838, a local team that incorporates students from several Rochester city schools. This requires a full-day Saturday commitment for six weeks—not for the faint of heart! Linda Maulding, a veteran engineer who leads Vertus' Robotics class, and Matt Rollins, a Vertus math teacher

Job Readiness Spotlight: Punctuality and Attendance

"Success starts with showing up." Almost everyone has heard this expression by the time they get to high school, but not everyone internalizes how important it is. As Vertus students start to prepare for success in the workplace as well as at school, one of the most important things for them to keep in mind is that **punctuality and attendance are extremely important to employers.**

Andrea Bertucci, Vertus' Career Program Manager, has over 10 years of experience working with teens and their employers. Over and over, businesses have told her that "if they couldn't count on someone to be there when they needed to be there, if students weren't on time and they

weren't at work, nothing else really mattered. If they couldn't be counted on, it didn't matter how great they were at everything else.

"There's a shift in responsibility that some students struggle with," Ms. Bertucci added. "When you come late to school, there's not always a consequence, or there's not the expectation that *you*, the student, will call to let someone know you're going to be late or absent. Usually it's on the parent or guardian. But what I had employers say to me was, 'I don't want someone's mom calling me. I need my employee to communicate with me directly.'"

So how can Vertus students be job-ready when it comes to punctuality and attendance? "Come to school every day on time! That's the best way to do it—start building those habits with school so that you already have them when you get to work." It's true wherever you go: you can't be successful if you aren't there.

Spreading Holiday Cheer: Community Service Projects on Two Learning Teams

The week before Vertus' holiday vacation, two learning teams took time out to remember that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Preceptor Ben Kadar took his students to the Toys for Tots warehouse on Buffalo Rd. and Preceptor Jamaal Peavy took a group of students across the street to Holy Apostles Catholic Church to help with their Christmas Blessing Project. Both groups spent quality time in community service and learned about how these two organizations serve the Rochester community at the holidays and throughout the year.

"Toys for Tots was started in 1948 by the Marine Corps Reserve to help families in need, not only families of military who were returning from the war but also families from the community," said Sharon Beeke, who is Toys for Tots' Rochester Warehouse Coordinator and who supervised our students during the project. "There was a huge need back then and there's still a huge need now. Everyone here is a volunteer; we do not take any money for anything. We are just here to help out our communities."

Students from Team Kadar spent their time sorting through Toys for Tots' enormous collection of donated gifts. Each gift must be tagged, inventoried, and sorted by age and gender before it can be given to a child. This was complicated work, but our young men pitched in with great enthusiasm and determination, sorting several hundred gifts in a matter of hours.

"We've been studying gratitude in seminar as one of our character strengths and we've learned that gratitude isn't just being thankful, but it's also giving back to show your appreciation," said Mr. Kadar. "So around this part of the year, the holidays, we wanted to do something special for our community. And it was a great experience—the guys did great and were really happy to be doing it."

Meanwhile, back at Holy Apostles, Team Peavy students were hard at work on the Christmas Blessing Project. "The church invites people who have registered to come and choose their own gifts for their children," said Betsy MacKinnon, LCSW, who is a part-time counselor at

Vertus and a longtime parishioner at Holy Apostles. "Then they take those gifts to a wrapping station, where all the gifts are wrapped for them, and they also receive a huge food basket for the Christmas season."

Team Peavy visited the Christmas Blessing Project twice: once to help set things up before families arrived and once to assist while families were visiting to pick out their gifts. Students did everything from greeting families to organizing tables and even wrapping presents.

"The kids were very gracious and I think they got to see that all of us have the responsibility to help others," said Ms. MacKinnon. "We talked about how important it is to give back to our community in some way. And this is just a very small little project that we do, yet 93 families were helped."

"It was a good experience to know how we gave back to the community, how we could help kids that need help and that can't afford toys," added Team Kadar student Anthony Perez "And it was also fun because we worked as a team."
