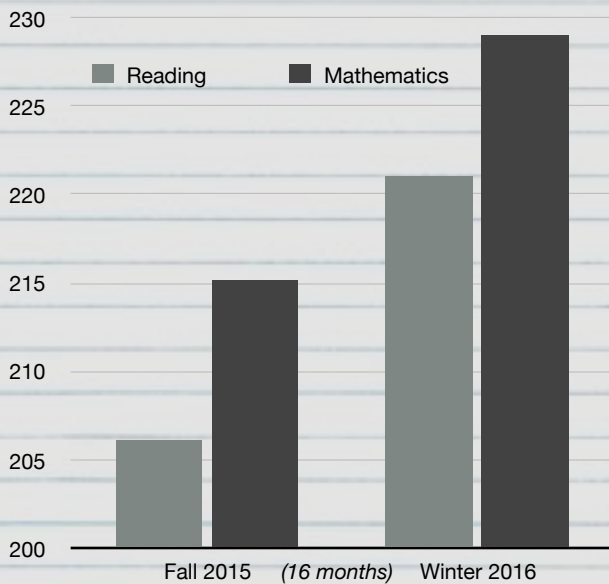


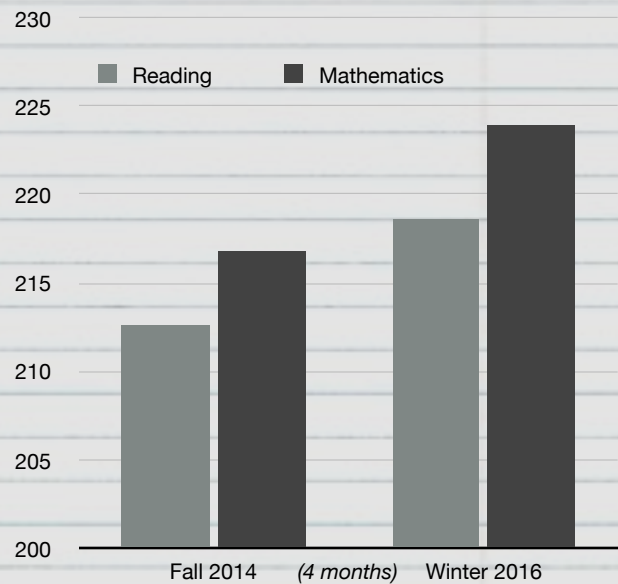


More Stellar NWEA Test Results for New and Returning Vertus Students



Second-Year Students

~ 4.5 years' growth in Reading in 16 months
~ 3 years' growth in Math in 16 months



First-Year Students

~ 2 years' growth in Reading in 4 months
~ 1 years' growth in Math in 4 months

Together, our students made 319.9% of expected progress in Reading and 291.3% of expected progress in Math.

These results speak for themselves: our young men are redefining what is usually considered possible. With personalized curriculum, extended learning time, goal-setting and rewards, joyful celebrations of achievement milestones, and being known and loved as individuals by Preceptors and other staff members, Vertus students are thriving both socially and academically—and it is **their** intelligence and hard work on display in these results. We couldn't be prouder of them!

Summer Employment for Vertus Students

Although it is only February, summer will be here before we know it. Vertus understands and supports the value of summer work opportunities for our students. Last year, we were able to offer 12 students the opportunity to work here at Vertus through the Summer of Opportunity e-NABLE program in partnership with RIT, RochesterWorks!, and the City of Rochester. We are hopeful that we will again be able to offer summer job opportunities here at Vertus to students in summer 2016.

Vertus' first responsibility is to ensure that all students are

academically on track to graduate from high school and succeed in their educational and career pursuits beyond high school. With this priority in mind,

students must meet certain minimum credit requirements to work during Vertus' summer hours,

which are 9:00 am to 3:00 pm Monday through Thursday and 9:00 am to 12:30 pm on Friday. Students with sufficient credits and permission from the school may be eligible to leave school at 12:00 each day to go to work in the afternoons.

Vertus is in the process of determining this minimum credit requirement for both first- and second-year students. We will notify families and students as soon as we have made the decision. STUDENT INTERVIEW: Board Chairman Ty Kelly

You've just become the Chairman of the Board at Vertus.

What does a Board Chair do?

The Board Chair oversees the leaders of the school and makes sure that what they put in their charter and the goals that they have set for you match up with what's happening. So I'm kind of like a watchman—I'm looking over their shoulders to make sure that they're doing the best they can for our students.

What is it about Vertus that made you want to be a part of the Board?

First of all, it's a school for young men, and I feel personally that there hasn't been enough attention paid to our young men. You guys have a lot of abilities and skills that people just don't appreciate, but I do—I was born and raised here and I had a lot of the same challenges that you are probably going through now. And my second reason was the whole model itself—the Preceptors, where you have one person responsible for 16 students and they're right here, located at the school, I think that is so important. You have somebody that you can go to here at the school, regardless of wherever you're having issues, at home or school or work—when you're here, there's someone looking out for you.

You currently work for Wegmans. How long have you worked there and what is your current job?

I've worked at Wegmans for 23 years, and I'm now the Director of Youth Development. I oversee educational programs for youth. Primarily we have the Hillside Work-Scholarship connection, and in our company, we have about 2,000 young men and women who came through the program who are working for us. And one of my accomplishments that I feel really good about is that young people who grew up here are now working at Wegmans everywhere—New York, New Jersey, Buffalo, Maryland, Syracuse—and they're doing really well in their careers.

How many teenagers have you hired over the years?

Thousands! If you're familiar with Wegmans, you know that we hire a lot of youth, starting at 15, usually to work on the front end as cashiers. So when I say thousands, I really mean thousands.

Are you living your childhood or teenage dreams?

Yes. I always wanted to get married, which I have, and I wanted to make enough money that my wife could stay home and raise our children—we were able to do that—and I wanted my children to have the kind of childhood where they could actually be a child. A lot of our young people have to forfeit their childhoods because they have to grow up so fast. They *have* to be a man or a woman because of the circumstances that they were born in, and in that case, that was true of me too. I had to grow up fast because I didn't live in a very nurturing environment at home and a lot of my childhood was a blur. But I have three children and four grandchildren, and all of them are doing well. So yes—I'm living my childhood dream.

What do you want for Vertus in the future?

I want you guys to be able to realize *your* childhood dreams. That's it. I want you to be able to do whatever you want to do.

Mr. Mackie has been a model student for his entire team this past month. He shows on a daily basis that courage, leadership, and responsibility are three keys to success at

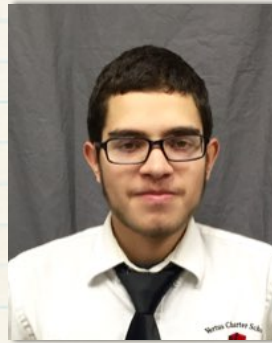

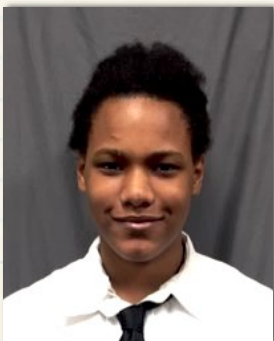
ELA Scholar of the Month

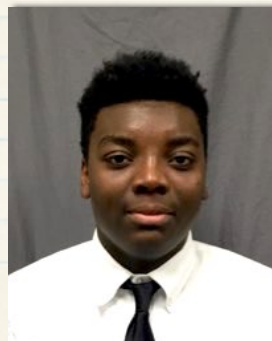
Math Scholar of the Month

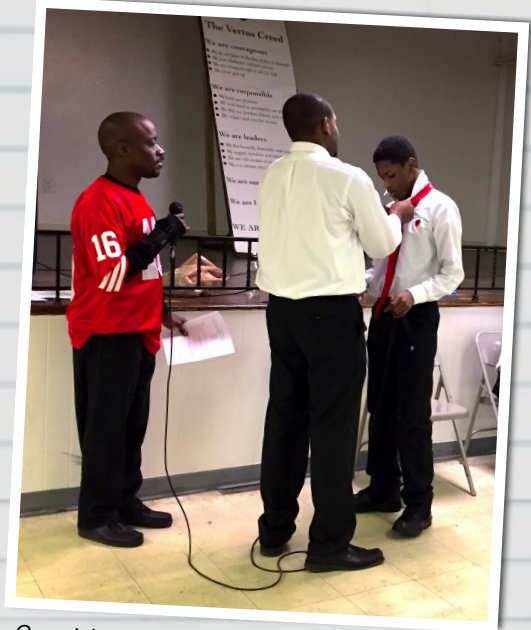
