

A Note From Dr. Mac

Our summer is off to a strong start! Summer is a good time for students to catch up in classes and to continue earning their credits. Vertus staff is doing their utmost to provide each student with individual help. We encourage our families to visit our school to see our learning labs and classes in action!

This summer, students who are on track to graduate do not have to attend school on Friday, although all students are welcome (we will provide RTS bus passes to any student who would like to come on Friday mornings to get extra help or do some extra work.) Students who need extra help to catch up in one or more classes are required to come on Friday mornings.

Vertus is designed to be different. Students begin at their own unique starting points and work until they have learned the material required to pass the Regents tests and graduate. Most schools give students only a set time to learn -- at the end of the time, the student gets an F if he hasn't mastered the material. Some schools move students along automatically from course to course and year to year -- only to discover that students cannot pass the Regents tests to graduate. We do not believe this is the best way to ensure students' success. We insist that all students learn, so that they can pass the Regents tests, graduate, and go on to college or a career.

We will have our first graduating class this coming spring. We expect more than 80% of our seniors to graduate in four years (and the rest to graduate in 5 years). The graduation rate for all male students attending schools within RCSD (as reported on the state's official report card) is 45% -- less than half! 




STUDENTS EARN SUMMER JOBS ON CAMPUS

e-NABLE

e-NABLE is a community of volunteers from all over the world who use 3D printers to create 3D printed hands and arms for those in need. This summer 17 Vertus students have joined the Rochester e-NABLE design team to help create new approaches to providing low cost prosthetics to people who can't otherwise afford them. Our design team students work each morning for a three-hour block, followed by our research team, who work three hours each afternoon.

The instructor team guiding our students this summer consists of highly qualified and



enthusiastic engineers and inventors, including the Founder of e-NABLE. Jon Schull. Schull is also the Co-Founder of Re-NABLE, and a former professor at RIT. Additionally, the lab is led by Skip Meetze, an e-NABLE Senior Designer, Co-Founder of Re-NABLE, and retired Xerox design engineer.

Multi-City College Tour

In addition to exploring potential career paths, Vertus students are supported in considering options for higher education. This fall, students will be given the opportunity to embark on a multi-city college tour over the course of three days. They will visit six colleges and universities and have the chance to tour each city, taking in the rich culture and history. This trip will allow our students to see the world through a wider lens and visualize how they may fit into a college community. The trip will include large, small, urban, rural, public, private, and historically black colleges.

Also, during the spring term, groups of students visited the University of Buffalo, Syracuse University, The College at Brockport, Buffalo State, and Alfred State. They toured each campus and maximized the opportunity by asking important questions about student life and academics.

Career Exploration

Emergency Medical Services

For the past year, our students have worked with local EMT's to learn the ins and outs of what it takes to become an EMT and maintain a job in Emergency Medical Services. Our EMS partners performed a mock vehicle accident where students observed what an emergency

rescue situation really looks like and the skills required to successfully manage it. They got some hands-on experience using a firehose, exploring the inside of an ambulance, and feeling the weight of a hydraulic rescue tool, also known as The Jaws of Life.

MCC Manufacturing





Through our continued partnership with Monroe Community College, several of our students have had the opportunity to gain valuable manufacturing experience, while also receiving college credit. In the Advanced Manufacturing class in the spring, they manufactured and assembled the parts of a small motor powered by compressed air. The goals of the partnership are to promote career exploration, while also preparing students for college and beyond.

Vertus students are encouraged to take advantage of our partnership with MCC to gain college credit and continue career exploration. More than 25 students will be taking courses at MCC this fall.
