Preceptor Program

As a former Preceptor I notice that teenage boys are more fragile today, due largely in part to their disenfranchisement within American society. As a result, our boys are joining gangs, dropping out of

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school, and becoming criminals at an alarming rate. The Preceptors here at Vertus have taken on the responsibility to reach back and grab the hands of these teenage boys and teach them what it is to be a man in our community. Our Preceptors can relate to students by using their experience to help them successfully navigate through life during these pivotal high school years. Students feel more confident that they will graduate with Preceptors guiding them through day-to-day, offering advice, making sure they get to school, and studying for exams. Preceptors are more than just mentors or role models, they serve as academic advisors, coaches, teachers, and in some cases stand in as family when students have no one else to turn to. They embody the third pillar upon which Vertus was founded,

Character Education.

This group of men go above and beyond school hours to support students and help them achieve their academic goals, as well as personal goals, all while building good character along the way. This guidance and support continues well after graduation with Preceptors helping students prepare for college, interviews, trade school, and anything else with which students might need assistance. For some of our students their Preceptor is the most consistent and reliable person in their lives, and they have shown to be one of the







a message from the PRINCIPAL

Vertus is founded on four pillars:

- Strong Relationships
- Personalized Year Round Academics
- Character Education
- Career Preparation

At the start of each school year, we work on building relationships with our students and their families through various ways and means. We promise to communicate with our families bi-weekly through phone calls or home visits, and we invite families to school three times a year for the opportunity to meet with staff to review their students' academic progress. This year we hosted a Senior Family Night to discuss college and career planning and to go

over the details of our annual Multi-City College Tour, which we make available to our fourth year students. We had over 50% of our families attend either that evening, or if they have a younger student, our first Family Night which was held on September 25th. We take time on these evenings to establish a strong channel of communication, which provides the foundation for our students' academic and social-emotional growth. New families are able to meet preceptors, teachers, and leadership staff, and become familiar with school policy while also having an opportunity to purchase school uniforms and have dinner. Returning families are given a clear picture of their student's academic growth and we begin discussions centered on goals for the new school year.

The saying "It takes a village to raise a child" rings true here at Vertus every day. We rely on the relationships we build to allow us to collaborate with our families and the community in order to create a successful path towards success for each student. Their growth and success is a measure of that. I am looking forward to watching that develop this year and we are off to a strong start!

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Multi-City College Tour 2019:

Vertus High School participated in its third annual multi-city college tour for 4th year students. This year, we traveled to colleges in New York and Pennsylvania. The college tour provided students with the opportunity to visit multiple college campuses, meet with admissions representatives, dine on campus, and explore the many opportunities that attending college has to offer. Students and chaperones spent three nights and four days on the road visiting HBCU schools (Lincoln University and Cheyney University) and large public colleges (Pennsylvania College of Technology and Temple University). In order to be eligible to attend, students had to meet certain requirements, and as always the tour was provided at no cost to our students.

MCC Program:

Once again through grant funding, Vertus has been able to offer classes at MCC this semester to eligible upper-level students. The available courses are part of a Precision Tooling Certification Program. Upon successful completion of the course, students receive dual enrollment credit (at MCC and Vertus).

Senior Parent Night:



We welcomed our senior class families to join us on September 17th for a night dedicated to navigating their last year with Vertus. Preceptors met with students and parents to outline their graduation pathways, and cheer them on to success. Ms. Flanagan held a college trip meeting, highlighting college visits and tour stops. We're excited to see these young men finish out the year strong and walk across the stage in June!

Cross Country recap from Coach Abron:



Tyzier Washington ran extremely well this season. He started the season with 23 minutes and 19 seconds. His best time was 21 minutes and 41 seconds. He has been consistently running 21 minutes in 5K (3 mile) races. His next race will be Saturday 10/26/19 at Robert's Wesleyan for the Private Parochial League Championship. This race may possibly be the end of his season, or carry him to sectionals. Charles Herring, our other cross country runner, had a slow start to the season with a time of 39 minutes and 32 seconds. In his second race of the season he cut 11 minutes off his time. In his last race he cut 4 minutes off his previous time running 24 minutes and 02 seconds in the 5K (3 mile) race.






We've had a successful fall semester at Vertus. Our students took the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) exams in September and returning students showed positive student growth compared to last year; many of our students made big gains in both Math and Reading. After taking the NWEA, students were placed into specific courses to meet their needs, this is a major element of our individualized learning program. Our blended learning model provides students both online credits and Regents prep courses that ensure student success. Not only are our students earning credits every day, many are well ahead on the path to graduation. Alongside our Regents prep and online Edgenuity courses, we now offer 3D Printing, African American Studies, and Creative Expression electives that have become a big hit at Vertus. Overall, this has been a great semester and we are excited for what the rest of the year has in store.

in the COMMUNITY


