Basketball

Vertus returned to a full basketball season this year playing 20 regular-season games. Coach Franklin's final year leading the varsity team finished the regular season re-




cord with an 8-12 record. Vertus secured the #8 spot in the class B2 Sectionals tournament and hosted Wayland-Cohocton in the first round. The Vertus Warriors advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Wayland-Cohocton 68-42. This was the 2nd team in Vertus history to win a sectionals game. The team traveled to #1 Dansville for a crushing 53-56 loss. The team was led by Senior guard Gerod Jackson who averaged 12.1

points/game and Sophomore Forward Reginald Pough who averaged 11.1 points/ game, 10.9 rebounds/game, and 1.3 blocks/game. We would like to thank all that each of our 6 seniors contributed over the past few years, you will be missed! Vertus Esports Lab

A new esports program at Vertus High School focused on educating our digitized youth — and in less than two months, has already elevated student

engagement and collaboration. And it is the first Esports program in Rochester 🍱 to offer high school credit toward graduation. The Vertus Esports Lab was created in early February with the National Esports Association (NEA), under the di-

rection of NEA president and CEO Lori Bajorek and educator Charles Colleran, made possible via a grant from the Daisy Marquis Jones Foundation. Many Vertus students participate in the esports program offered during the sixth, seventh, and eighth periods. The STEM program focused on the game Minecraft and NEA's "Build Your Community" program. Vertus students are building their communities and homes and are actively learning about green energy, electricity, architecture, and geometry. After a brief learning

curve, all of the students involved have completed the first building challenge and speaking presentation with flying colors! On presentation day, each student gave a memorable speech describing their build while answering their peers' critical analysis and critical thinking questions. In a short

amount of time, the students have become their community inside the classroom. They are organizing a Smash Bros. tournament, organizing all aspects, from

designing the logo, recruiting students, coordinating with administration, and hopefully broadcasting play-by-play on the live stream on Twitch. The buzz that the Esports class has continued to build as the semester moves on. We are excited to expand the program moving forward in the future!



Second Annual Community Fair


